Launched in 2008, **2+2 program** was established to create cultural and educational exchange between undergraduate students from China and the United States. This unique program provides the platform and an opportunity for our students to interact, learn, share the ideas, network and create experiences that are unique. The 2+2 program at the University of Maryland is a two-year transfer program. Following two years of study at a university in China, participating students transfer to Maryland where they will complete their education and earn a bachelor's degree. Since its inception, we graduated numerous Chinese students and are looking forward to many more. **Come and join us, as we are looking forward to working with and supporting you through application process!**

This hand-out is designed to help you navigate application process. As you will see in this document there are some important factors to remember: class credits in USA vs. China, language proficiency, number of classes taken per semester at UMD, application deadlines, admission requirements, tuition, fees and certification of finances, immigration visa check list.

IMPORTANT DATES

March 1 – UMD deadline to Apply to 2+2 Program.

Feb. 1- Please notify your university coordinator of plans to apply for 2+2. Seek recommendation from your university to this program.

Mid- to Late April --The acceptance decisions are released by email

Late May – Early June:
I-20 issued, mailed to you from UMD

Mid-August -- UMD Orientation – you must register for Orientation

August 29-- First day of class



Please be mindful by some of the following factors:

- **The course credits:** please be mindful that not all credits earned at your home university would transfer to UMD. One such difference is that our university has practical courses given in laboratory classrooms. If you did not have laboratory courses in China, you may have to take them at UMD.
- **Language proficiency:** English language proficiency is very important for full time enrolling as a UMD student. Students will need to take TOEFL test and score 100 (points) and higher or take ILETS test and score minimum 7 points so they can take regular classes and graduate in two years. For students who score lower on these two tests, they will have to take additional English classes, which will prolong their graduation process by one semester or a year or longer.
- Please be mindful that **amount of classes taken** per semester are between 4 -7. However, majority of students will be taking 4 as all classes are conducted in English language.

TIPS

- You will be applying as **An International Transfer Student**
- Spell your name and email address correctly. **PLEASE BE CONSISTENT** in listing your Family name (Last name), Given Name (First Name), Middle Name on all documents.

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INTERNATIONAL APPLICANTS

We are committed to enrolling a diverse student body from around the globe. As part of that commitment, we seek to enroll international students who demonstrate strong academic performance with records suggesting potential for success at Maryland.

Maryland considers an international student to be any student with a visa or international course work.

For international students, the Admission Committee will also consider factors such as TOEFL/IELTS scores, national education system and types of institutions attended.

Application Deadlines >

International freshman applicants planning to enroll beginning in the fall semester must submit their completed application by November 1. International transfer applicants planning to enroll beginning in the fall semester must submit their completed application by March 1.

International freshman and transfer applicants planning to enroll beginning in the spring semester must submit their completed application by August 1.

Non-native English Speakers >

If English isn't your native language—regardless of your citizenship—you must provide the university with verification of your proficiency in English. Have an official report of your scores from the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or the International English Language Testing System (IELTS) sent directly to the Office of Undergraduate Admissions by the appropriate application date. The Office of Undergraduate Admissions will consider all materials submitted in the application package to determine your level of English proficiency.

Non-U.S. Academic Credentials

Freshman

If you have non-U.S. academic credentials, provide all academic records—secondary and college—in the original language with a certified English translation. If you attended secondary school outside of the United States, you must provide, where appropriate, official results and certificate of completion from a national secondary school examination (such as the GCSE or Baccalaureat). Maryland encourages and accepts third party international academic evaluations from the following agencies: AACRAI, WES and ECC. Evaluations must be received by the appropriate application deadline.

Transfer Students

If you have non-U.S. academic credentials, provide all academic records—all post-secondary institutions—in the original language with a certified English translation. Maryland accepts third party international academic evaluations from the following agencies: AACRAI, WES and ECC. Evaluations must be received by the appropriate application deadline. To receive transfer credits, the University of Maryland requires you to submit catalog descriptions or syllabi of your coursework. Course syllabi and descriptions must be translated from the original language into English and certified by a professional translator. The transcripts should include all university-level course work completed to date, including current term in progress. Financial Certification >

If you hold or intend to seek an F-1 Student or J-1 Exchange Visitor visa, you must complete the Certification of Finances, including providing bank statements that demonstrate sufficient funds to cover these expenses.

Visas >

If you hold a nonimmigrant visa other than F-1 Student or J-1 Exchange Visitor, you must submit a photocopy of your I-94 Arrival/Departure Record and visa stamp.

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INTERNATIONAL APPLICANT GUIDELINES

Follow these general guidelines to ensure we can process your international application as efficiently as possible.

Maryland considers an international student to be any student with a visa or international course work.

1. **Use your full legal name on all documents.** Make sure that your full legal name, as it appears on your passport, is spelled correctly and consistently on your application and all supporting documents. We won't be able to issue the necessary immigration documents if the name on your application materials (application fee, test scores, Certificate of Finances Form, bank statement or Affidavit of Financial Support, academic records, etc.) differs from your name on your passport.

2. **Submit all application materials together.** This includes your application fee, academic records, recommendations (if using paper recommendations), Certificate of Finances Form and financial support documentation, and visa information when applicable. Official scores from the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or the International English Language Testing System (IELTS) should be sent directly to the Office of Undergraduate Admissions by the appropriate application deadline. To assist in matching your official scores with your application, you may submit copies of your test score reports with your application materials. Please note that your English proficiency test scores are not considered official until we receive them directly from the testing agencies. Maryland encourages and accepts third party international academic evaluations from the following agencies: AACSB, WES and ECE. Evaluations must be received by the appropriate application deadline.

3. **Avoid submitting unnecessary materials.** Please do not send unnecessary supporting documents or items such as photographs, recordings, writing samples, awards or commendations, etc. The university will not be responsible for keeping them or storing them in your file. If you would like us to know about any of your extracurricular activities, talents or awards, please include that information in your personal statement.

4. **Do not list a post office box as your permanent foreign address.** In order for us to issue your I-20 form, the permanent home address listed on your application for admission must be a foreign address. When completing your application, be sure to provide a foreign street address (not a P.O. box) as your permanent home address.

5. **Use the correct university mailing address.** Send all materials to:

Applicants will create a password and PIN that they should always remember. The password and PIN will allow them to do the following: complete the on-line application, track their documents, and check their admission decision.

APPLICATION CHECKLIST FOR ADMISSIONS AND ISSS

- Apply at: https://app.applyyourself.com/AYApplicantLogin/fl_ApplicantLogin.asp?id=umd
- Deadline is March 1.** This deadline is strict and no students will be considered after March 1.
- Make sure your **email address is correct** on the application, so you can receive decisions and updates regarding your application. All UMD communication will be done via email.
- Transcripts must original and in Chinese language and in English language.
- TOEFL minimum direct admit score is 100.
- IELTS minimum test score is 7 in order to attend all regular classes in English.
IELTS score of 6.5 or lower—students will be attending Maryland English Institute prior to being able to attend regular classes in English. Depending on student’s level of English, this classes can be taken for one semester, one year or longer. Student will have to test out in order to be able to attend regular classes.
- TOEFL or IELTS scores must be mailed to UMD by the testing service. Please remember:

- Personal biographical information – birth date, race, home address.
- Essay topics you will find on the application. Please answer one by writing an essay of minimum 500 words. One topic is: May be why you are applying to University of Maryland, etc.

- Certification of Finances is needed for your F1 student visa application – plan ahead! You must have certified bank statements!



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ADMITTED TRANSFER STUDENTS

Congratulations on your admission to the university! There are just a few more steps to take to become a Terp.

1. **Review your letter of admission on the application portal.** It includes important information about your major and residency status. You will need to log in to the application portal using your PIN and password. Click on "Your application decision is now available online."
2. **Plan a campus visit.** Now that you've been admitted, join us for an Admitted Student Open House, take a tour or attend an event to become acquainted with our students and faculty.
3. **Respond to your offer of admission.** If you choose to confirm your enrollment (and we hope you do!), please refer to your admission decision letter on the application portal. With your letter is a **hopeLink** that allows you to confirm your enrollment. It may take up to 48 business hours for your confirmation to be processed and posted to your record. If you decide not to attend UMD, we ask that you decline your offer of admission through the application portal.
4. **Submit your non-refundable \$500 enrollment deposit to reserve your space in the incoming class.** This enrollment deposit will be applied to your tuition. If you choose not to pay your enrollment deposit by credit card, it is activation on a bill or wide invoice is for when some decisions.
5. **Find out how you can receive transfer credit** for your courses and course credit for AP, CE and IB exams.

Learn more about need-based aid, merit scholarships and other ways to finance your education.

Read about the Mandatory Health Insurance requirement and download the Immunization Form.

Complete the housing request/preferring form available through the application portal. Find out more about on and off campus housing and living.

Prepare for your arrival to Maryland by investigating technology and communication services and learning more about transportation and parking on campus.

Register for orientation, select a date, create a university email and directory ID, take the online math placement exam and fill out required surveys through the Orientation Office.

Submit your most recent college transcripts as soon as your grades are posted so we may promptly evaluate your transfer credit. You must may your transcripts to the Office of Undergraduate Admissions.
