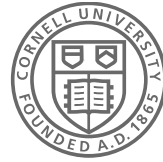

Terms of Attending Cornell University's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (CALS) under the "2+2" Transfer Agreement with your home institution

Transfer Credits and Degree Completion

You will enter Cornell CALS with 60 credits from your home institution (full junior status). You will have the opportunity to complete a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree with an additional 60 credits earned at Cornell.

Upon arriving on campus, you will meet with the CALS Assistant Registrar to review the application of the credits earned at your home institution to your CALS degree (this is referred to as a Transfer Credit Evaluation).

Major Requirements

You must complete the requirements of the major to which you have been admitted.

Specific Major Requirements

Food Science Majors: Must take 30 credits in Food Science while at Cornell.

Landscape Architecture Majors: Must plan to spend 3 years at Cornell (your faculty advisor will confirm your length of study).

CALS Requirements

You must complete all academic requirements and remain in good academic standing, as defined by CALS.

Cornell Requirements

You must abide by campus behavior as set forth in the Campus Code for Academic Conduct.

Advising Resources and Policies

A CALS faculty member will provide academic advisement during your time at Cornell. The Assistant Registrar will serve as your point of contact in the CALS Student Services Office.

It is understood that your academic interests may evolve while at Cornell. There are many ways to reflect your academic interests on your official record by possibly pursuing a minor or an additional major.

- Minors: You may declare a minor with approval from your faculty advisor and the CALS Assistant Registrar.
- Double Majors: It may also be possible to declare a double-major within CALS, with approval from your faculty advisor, the CALS Assistant Registrar and your home institution. Declaring a double-major would most likely require spending more than 2 years at Cornell.

Financial Aid

Cornell University financial aid is rarely available.
